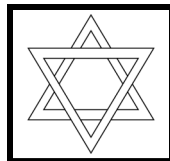
KI TAVO

Ki Tavo is one of the last sections of the Torah. It contains the description of an ancient ritual whereby the priests would pronounce benedictions and curses. The late Chief Rabbi Hertz preferred the word "admonitions".

All modern translations of the Bible follow his lead.

Indeed, they are warnings and attempts to sway the believers that nothing good would result from their transgressing the teachings of righteousness of the Torah.

They should, therefore, follow the right path so that they may feel rewarded.
