We survived the High Holy Days in a way none of us ever imagined possible. I, for one, pray that we never have to do it that way again.

I am so grateful for everyone who worked so hard to help us pull our services and programs together, and who scrambled to make some big improvements between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Overall, we hosted between 60-90 people on Zoom for each service, and an additional 50-70 tuned in via our website and Facebook pages. Special thanks to our advi-

sory committee, Marilyn Newberg, Rhoda Lessner, Arnie Becker, and Tom Behrendt. Thanks to Rosemary Abrami for a beautiful Kol Nidre, Charlie Tarnor & Keren Goldberg for lovely haftarot, and also to Keren for harmonizing with a number of melodies without the Zoom lag effect. We're all grateful to Lou and Jan Sniderman for numerous updates of our website, and for figuring out how to link our Zoom services to Facebook, and then link the Facebook videos to our website. Thanks to all who helped prepare & distribute the Rosh Hashanah kits and Machzorim. And an extra special virtual hug to Tricia Thomas, our dedicated office manager, for the time and effort she put in to helping it all come together. I'm very proud of us all.

The aspect of these surreal days that I personally enjoyed the most were the pre- and post- services shmoozing. Thanks to all of you who just hung out chatting & listening, and provided a time for informal personal connections that we are so terribly missing. We had lots of mistakes & slip-ups, some of the technology didn't work like we had hoped. But through it all, you kept everything warm & haimish, even when we couldn't really be face to face.

We still have Sukkot, Simchat Torah, and lots of Shabbat services to go in this isolation mode. So I invite those of you who finally were able to go online for services, now, to come back for more opportunities to connect. "But, Rabbi," you may ask. "I don't go to shul regularly when it's actually in person. Why should I go when it's only on my computer screen?"

Three reasons:

- No travel time you don't need to worry about the heat or rain or, eventually, cold.
- You may come to services barefoot, and no one will look at you funny.
- Let's face it, it's fun. And honestly, what else do you have going on? And if you don't enjoy it, you can log off, and if anyone asks, you can tell them you were having computer problems.

Seriously, though, staying active in a faith community, even if it's only online, is a powerful way to fend off feelings of isolation & depression.

John F. Kennedy said, "When written in Chinese, the word 'crisis' is composed of two characters. One represents danger and the other represents opportunity."

How true his words ring these days. Danger, not only in the sense of the highly contagious and brutal nature of the coronavirus, but also in the toll that the extended shutdown and physical distancing is having on houses of worship. The very activities which bring us together as a community are the ones that generate the highest risk of infection - speaking, singing, praying, congregating, and let's not even think about shofar blowing. There are many small synagogues across the country that are finding themselves shuttered permanently because they no longer are able to sustain the financial support of their members and their community.

So far, we have been very blessed by help from outside sources: the 8 month rental of the back lot, hosting the Hacienda de Sarah program during weekdays, receipt of a Payroll Protection Loan/Grant to cover part of salary expenses, and the rezoning of the back lot for potential sale. These have all been godsends, and we are grateful. But we need members to keep us going. If you are financially able, please be sure to bring your financial commitments current, and if you have been a guest at our services, we respectfully invite you to invest in the continuity of Jewish spiritual life in the West Valley by joining Beth Emeth. I promise, we are the best synagogue value in the Valley.

May you be blessed with a healthy, happy, prosperous, and NORMAL year to come.

They address all the religious, medical, social and other needs of Jewish inmates throughout the entire United States. They provide all holiday foods and materials as well as year round Jewish books and materials, visits, courses, etc.

The Aleph Institute also does the same for members of the United States Military who are Jewish.

The Aleph Institute's team has grown from just one Rabbi to more than 65 dedicated staff members and over 500 volunteers, who literally save lives, helping countless individuals during some of the darkest moments of their lives and impacting thousands of families through their work.

TRANSLITERATION TROUBLE?


If you generally have trouble reading transliterations, try these: "E" sounds like "A" in day, "A" sounds like "A" in father; "I" sounds like "e" in seen; "U" sounds like "oo" in moon; "O" sounds like "O" in go or flow.

One really confusing consonant appears as \underline{H} (underlined), H with a dot underneath it, KH or CH - all are pronounced the same - think of the Jewish toast "L'Chaim."

A few people have admitted trouble reading transliterated Hebrew. I often compare it to pronouncing words written in Spanish. Of course, there are always exceptions.

TOO MANY HOLIDAYS?

As a kid growing up in a Jewish family one of my frequent complaints was that we Jews have too many holidays. October is an excellent example, with Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah all in a row.

Each has special rules of Jewish observance, called Halakha, and each has many interpretations.



One source tells us of a minimum Sukkah dimension of twenty-six square inches and more than three feet high. Another source instructs us to erect a Sukkah large enough for a family to eat and live in.

There are rules regarding the construction of a Sukkah, which include the placement of *skakh* in place of a weatherproof roof. It goes on to say the *skakh* should be evenly spaced across the Sukkah, should provide more shade than sun but should allow you to see the stars at night - but

not so dense that rain will not enter the Sukkah.

According to Jewish Law, all food eaten during Sukkot should be eaten in the Sukkah and meals should begin with a special blessing to G-d "who has commanded us to dwell in the Sukkah."

Sukkot is also an agricultural holiday, celebrating the harvest in the land of Israel. We recite special prayers while holding four varieties of plants in our hands, including the *Lulav* (palm branch), bound together with myrtle twigs and willow twigs. The fourth plant is the *Etrog* (citron).

It is unclear whether Shemini Atzeret is independent of Sukkot. The Talmud refers to six signs that Shemini Atzeret is independent and these are interpreted in different ways. They are (1) the different rotation of the priests in the temple; (2) the recital of she-he-heyanu" (3) not mitzvah to dwell in the Sukkah or use the four species; (4) calling the day Shemini Atzeret, not Sukkot; (5) a different order of sacrifices; and (6) a different Psalm for the day recited by the Levites. Each of these marks a difference between Shemini Atzeret and Sukkot.


Our observance of Shemini Atzeret includes a prayer for rain and recital of Yizkor - the memorial prayer for the dead.

Simchat Torah is observed on the day after Shemini Atzeret. This marks the completion and beginning again of the cycle of Torah readings. The completion is marked by *hak-kafot* - circling - that are similar to circling with the four species during Sukkot. In some places there is singing and dancing with the Torah scrolls.
