#### **CHANUKAH - TWO MIRACLES?**

The Talmud asks - "What is Chanukah?" A strange question for the Talmud to be asking. They know, of course, what the holiday commemorated. Did they not themselves ordain Chanukah as an eight-day celebration beginning with the twenty-fifth of Kisley?

Most of us know to some degree the story of Chanukah, of the victory of the brave Maccabees against the Greeks and of the miracle of the cruse of oil that burned for eight days instead of one. If we look closely, the early history is not clear, and the story is not so simple.

The story tells us that one day the Greeks came to the village of Modi'in and set up an altar, commanding the Jews to bring a pig as a sacrifice to show obedience to Antiochus's decree. Mattathias, an old priest was so enraged when he saw a Jew about to do so that he killed him. He and his five sons then fought the Green detachment, retreated to the mountains, and began a guerilla war against the Greeks and their Jewish allies. Before he died of old age, Mattathias passed on the leadership to his son, Judah the Maccabee and through superior strategy and bravery he defeated them all. Finally, he and his followers liberated Jerusalem and reclaimed the temple from its defilement by the Greeks.

They could find only one cruse of oil, enough to last one day, but when they lit the temple menorah with it, a miracle occurred and the menorah burned for eight days. Since then we celebrate Chanukah to remember the Maccabees and their successful fight for independence against the Greeks, and most of all, the miracle of oil. #### FROM THE DESK OF RABBI TRACEE ROSEN



"Darkness cannot drive out darkness: only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that." — Martin Luther King, Jr.

At this season, the days have gotten shorter, the night stretches on. Imagine how the onset of winter must have affected our prehistoric ancestors. With the increasing darkness and corresponding dip in the temperatures, the ob-

vious conclusion was that somehow the sun was being diminished and losing its power. All over the northern hemisphere, people created ceremonies to push back against the darkness, and honor the "rebirth" of the sun. They recognized that after the darkest of days, somehow the light would start to increase again, that spring and its promise of rebirth was on its way. The Feast of Juul (or Yule) in Scandinavia, the Roman celebration of Saturnalia, Chanukah, and eventually, Christmas all involved acts of bringing light back into the world by human effort

For the past 9 months, our world has been cast into a great metaphorical darkness. We suffer, remembering friends and family members lost to this horrid disease, and those who got sick and recovered slowly. We mourn the holidays, birthdays, and anniversaries spent in isolation without the reassuring presence of our loved ones. We have attended services, parties, weddings, b'nei mitzvah, and even funerals, by staring at little boxes filled with people we love on our computer or smartphone screens. This time last year, Zoom was the sound your grandkid's toy car makes, Black Friday happened at the big box stores, and having groceries and restaurant food delivered to our homes only happened if you lived in Manhattan.

Still, we have adapted. Some of us attended Passover seders or Rosh Hashanah gatherings with dozens of family members from all over the country or even the world, putting us all in the same place in a way that never could have happened in "real life." We have reconnected with friends and relatives who have been out of touch for years. We have learned to relax our reliance on the clock and even the calendar.

As I write this, the pandemic seems as far from being over. Infection rates in Arizona are at an all-time high. According to Banner Health, they are about one week away from their hospitals exceeding capacity. Over 1 million new cases are being diagnosed each week throughout the US. While the percentage of people dying from the disease has dropped significantly, our health systems are being overwhelmed. It's now health care workers rather than space or equipment that are in short supply.

Rabbi Shneur Zalman of Liadi, the founder of the Chabad branch of Hasidism, wrote, "a little bit of light dispels a lot of darkness." As we prepare to light our Chanukah candles this year, we can remember this saying and realize that this message of Chanukah applies to many aspects of our lives. In the darkest of hours, the Jewish people have always kindled a light, favored hope over despair.



Are you puzzled by the changing relationship between American Jews and Israelis? Curious about why non-Jewish Americans have historically displayed such strong support for Israel? Worried that our kids and grandkids don't feel the strong connection that we have always taken for granted? Thanks to the generosity of the Shalom Hartman Institute, we will tackle these issues & more through an exciting online series of study & discussion with some of Judaism's leading thinkers today.

Through video lectures, interviews, and textual sources, this 14-unit course addresses the complex features of Jewish peoplehood and the contemporary challenges to the Jewish people in an era in which we have moved from having no home to having two different, vibrant, homes in Israel and in North America.
