PURIM - SELF MOCKERY AND MASQUERADE

Here is a holiday that permits - no, encourages - frivolity. It is a joyful celebration during which sacredness is sacrificed and replaced by foolishness.

The name Purim means "lots," because the wicked Haman used a lot (pur) to decide when to kill the Jews.

We read the story of Esther, which is included in the bible, but is not part of the Five Books of Moses. The story is therefore only of rabbinic origin.

The Purim story revolves around the reading of the Megillah - scroll of Esther. Each time the name of the villain, Haman, is read, we make noise to drown out the name. Other rituals include sending gifts of food to friends, giving money to the poor. We also celebrate with costumes, plays, parodies, masquerades and heavy liquor consumption. These activities are designed to make Purim a day when a Mardi Gras spirit runs rampant.

As the Purim story begins, proud queen Vashti is banished and Esther is chosen in a beauty contest to be the new queen. Haman becomes Grand Visier, but Esther's protector, Mordechai refuses to bow down to him. Haman decides to take his anger out on all Jews and convinces King <u>Abasuerus</u> to decree the massacre of all the Jews throughout his kingdom. Mordechai and Esther go to work to counteract the decree. Ester wines and dines the king, then tells him that she is Jewish and pleads for her people. Haman is hanged and the Jews turn the tables on their enemies. Mordechai and Esther live happily ever after - and Purim becomes an annual holiday.

The story has led to much debate among scholars who question its historical accuracy. Some facts in the story are contradicted by other historical evidence and may be considered as a farce - just plain whimsy based on unanswered questions posed by the scholars. It either really happened or is pure fantasy or an exaggeration of a historical incident. (Continued on bottom of page 2)

Either way, the Book of Esther and Purim have been accepted by the Jewish people as part of the festive cycle. It is a time to let loose, masquerade as somebody else and let yourself be "so drunk as not to be able to tell the difference between 'blessed be Mordechai' and 'cursed be Haman.'"

<u>The</u> Purim food is hamantaschen, triangular cookies (supposedly reminiscent of Haman's hat) filled with any number of things, though prune and poppy-seed fillings are most popular. Jews in Italy enjoy a similar sweet called orecchi di Haman (Haman's ear) cookies.

Most of us have heard of The Simon Wiesenthal Center, but know little or nothing about it. The Simon Wiesenthal Center is a Jewish global human rights organization researching the Holocaust and hate in a historic and contemporary context. The Center confronts anti-Semitism, hate and terrorism, promotes human rights and dignity, stands with Israel, defends the safety of Jews worldwide, and teaches the lessons of the Holocaust for future generations. With a constituency of over 400,000 households in the United States, it is accredited as an NGO at international organizations including the United Nations, UNESCO, OSCE, Organization of American States (OAS), the Latin American Parliament (PARLATINO) and the Council of Europe.

Founded by Rabbi Marvin Hier, The Simon Wiesenthal Center is headquartered in Los Angeles and maintains offices in New York, Toronto, Miami. Chicago, Paris, Buenos Aires, and Jerusalem.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES:

Over the last year, the programs and services provided by the Simon Wiesenthal Center, including its Museum of Tolerance in Los Angeles have impacted greatly on people the world over.

Moriah Films is the two-time Academy Award[®]-winning film division of the Simon Wiesenthal Center which has produced the most significant collection of documentaries on the epic events that have shaped modern Jewish history. Narrators for Moriah Films have included Elizabeth Taylor, Orson Welles, Sir Ben Kingsley, Michael Douglas, Dustin Hoffman, Nicole Kidman, Morgan Freeman, Christoph Waltz, Anne Bancroft, Leonard Nimoy and Sandra Bullock. Its fourteenth documentary, *The Prime Ministers: Soldiers and Peacemakers*, a behind-the-scenes look at the epic moments of Israel¹s history and its relationship to U.S. Presidents, is premiering across the United States and Canada. Tens of millions of people have seen Moriah's films in theaters, streaming through Netflix, and on cable and television around the world.

The **Museum of Tolerance Los Angeles** challenges visitors to confront bigotry and racism and to understand the Holocaust in both historic and contemporary contexts. Since opening in 1993, the Museum has hosted over 5 million visitors. More than 2.5 million children and youth have participated in the Museum experience and its programs, and almost 200,000 adults have been trained in the Museum¹s customized professional development programs over the last 20 years. "Anne"- the Museum¹s newest exhibition has been called, "The most important exhibition about Anne Frank" by the Anne Frank Fonds in Basel, Switzerland and, "The most extensive exploration of Anne Frank in any museum outside Amsterdam," by the *New York Times*.

The **Museum of Tolerance Jerusalem**, currently under construction and scheduled open in 2022 has been praised by Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu as "very distinctive and elegant - a beautiful fit for the city of Jerusalem," the Museum will deal with the vital issues of the 21st century and celebrate the vibrancy of Israel¹s democracy.

ADL was founded in 1913 by Chicago attorney Sigmund Livingston. He envisioned an America where those who seemed different were not targets of discrimination and threats, but were equally worthy of shared opportunity and a place in the American dream.

The Anti Defamation League is based on Jewish values which guide the strategy and tactics of all their programs and activities globally, nationally and locally.

Among the ADL's values are the courage to speak out against anti-Semitism and bigotry, discrimination and justice - even when they stand alone. They believe in the power of inclusion and uniting people from diverse groups while always observing the highest standards of integrity.

The organization is viewed as having unquestioned credibility because its actions draw from years of experience and are grounded in research.

Today, they also fight threats to our very democracy, including cyberhate, bullying, bias in schools and in the criminal justice system, terrorism, hate crimes, coercion of religious minorities, and contempt for anyone who is different.

ADL's Israel advocacy extends from campuses to the worlds of politics and diplomacy. They also promote respect for all within Israel. Their acclaimed education programs guide youth and adults to reject biases, appreciate differences and create welcoming environments.

Editor's note: I remember the Anti Defamation League as being a function of B'nai B'rith, but was informed by the B'nai B'rith organization that ADL has functioned as an independent organization for many years. Are you puzzled by the changing relationship between American Jews and Israelis? Curious about why non-Jewish Americans have historically displayed such strong support for Israel? There are no religious or halachic guidelines pertaining to the naming of Jewish children, although in the United States, the rabbis are asked more questions about what is and is not permissible in this area than about any other single area of ritual, moral or ethical conduct.

In the Diaspora, where children are generally given Gentile names in the civil birth records, the giving of an additional Yiddish or Hebrew name provides an important identification with the Jewish people and the Hebrew faith. It is the Hebrew or Yiddish name that is given at the brit or in the synagogue, as the case may be, which is thereafter used for all religious purposes, religious documents and prayers. It is by this name that a person is called up to the Torah and that one uses in offering prayers for one's health, in drawing up a wedding contract, etc.
