PASSOVER (PESACH)

According to custom, all firstborn fast on the day before Passover to commemorate having been spared during the Plague of the Firstborn during the time of the Exodus. The fast begins at sunrise rather than the previous night. It is a minor fast day and not widely observed.

On the day before Pesach, a mostly symbolic search of our homes for hametz is conducted. Some people hide a few pieces of bread so that children who participate in the search will have something to find.



There are special prayers regarding the search, nullification and destruction of hametz. Many Jewish households arrange the sale of hametz to non-Jews so it is not in their homes during Pesach.

Traditions vary, but most observant Jews have a complete set of dishes, silverware and cooking utensils which are re-

served for Pesach only. There have been Jewish homes in which an entire kitchen and pantry have been set aside so they may be utilized exclusively for Passover. Surely, they are much more affluent and observant than this writer.

The actual Pesach Seder described in various editions of the Haggadah (of which over 3,000 have been published), details the Seder plate and what it should contain, which prayers much be recited and, most importantly, the story of the Exodus.

The Passover story draws each of us into its telling and reminds us, "Whoever expands upon the story of the Exodus deserves praise."

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI TRACEE ROSEN

As we transition this time from Purim to Pesach, we encounter 2 Jewish models of redemption: Purim, where God seems absent or at least operating behind the scenes, and Pesach, where God brings redemption directly ("I and not an angel."). How do we believe redemption occurs?

Both models are valid, but it seems to me that Judaism has always favored the proactive model - the model of Purim. God puts each of us in the right place at the right time and then it's up to us to make good choices that save the day.

Think about this past year. A horrible virus has been ravaging the planet. God did not bring a miracle and cause it to disappear. Instead, the Holy One gave wisdom, knowledge, and understanding to human beings. Scientists studied for years, first discovering DNA, the code for what happens in every living cell. Years later, scientists from around the world collaborated on mapping the human genome, which has enabled decades of advancement in precisely how our genetic code works. By the time the virus hit, they had developed a theoretical way to create vaccines by manufacturing messenger RNA which could be used to train our bodies to resist the virus without exposing us to the illness itself.

Scientists, corporations, philanthropists, and even politicians managed to create a process in a matter of days and weeks to accelerate the development and testing of treatments and vaccines faster than ever before in human history. Mistakes were made, for certain, and over 2 million lives have been lost to-date worldwide. But through the miracle of the right people being in the right place at the right time, we are now witnessing the biggest miracle of our lifetimes.

The pandemic of 1918 resulted in the death of approximately 3.3% of the world's population. Translated into today's terms, that would have resulted in over 200 million lives lost. The actual rate of 2 million, horrific as it is, is 100 times smaller. That's a miracle.

In one year's time, we have been transformed from a country that manufactures almost no vaccines ourselves, to a situation where nearly half of the most vulnerable (ages 65+) are already vaccinated in just over 3 months time. That's a miracle.

We have remained mostly physically apart for a full year, yet we have found new ways to connect and be present for each other. After years of living thousands of miles apart, Rosemary and her sister, Lynette, share Shabbat together nearly every week - via the shul in Durban on Fridays and on our zoom on Saturday mornings. Others of us have celebrated milestones alone, while surrounded by the images and voices of all those we love from near and far. That's a miracle, too.

Passover

Through all that we can be grateful for, we hold on to a deep yearning to reconnect in person. Our COVID safety committee will be meeting this week to agree on reopening guidelines. Any in-person activities will require the participants to have completed the full course of vaccination- 2 shots for the Pfizer & Moderna doses & 1 shot for Johnson & Johnson. Please send a copy of your completed vaccine card to the office, so we can verify your status.

I would like to begin in-person services around the end of March, in time for Pesach, if we have enough people who have received their full doses by March 15. Please contact Claudia in the office if you are willing to participate in on-site services, and possibly a limited size community Seder.
