Yom HaShoah is observed on the seventh day of Nisan. It serves to remind us of the atrocities committed against the Jewish people by the Nazis. In Israel there is a uniformly observed practice at Eleven A.M. on that day. All people stop whatever they are doing and stand at attention. Likrat Shabbat, the prayer book Beth Emeth has used during Erev Shabbat services (when we were still able to join together in the temple's library), has a special prayer for Israel's Independence Day. Nearer the end of April is Lag B'Omer, named for the Hebrew letters <i>Lamed</i> (which stands for the number thirty) and <i>Gimmel</i> (which stands for the number three). The seven weeks between Pesach and Shavout are considered in Jewish Law as a period of semi-mourning during which no marriages are to be performed, but the rabbis made an exception for Lag B'Omer. You will also be asked to sign a waiver not to hold Beth Emeth responsible should you come down with the virus. ONLY members in good standing will be allowed to attend. You will be checked in at the door. Anyone who has not complied with our rules will be asked to leave! We will do everything in our power to make our shul as safe as we can, YOU must do your part for all of us to be safe.

I would like to implore that you pay your dues in full. Most of you who know me, know that Beth Emeth is my second home. I want to keep its doors open for as long as we can. We can not do this without you. The excuse to not pay because we are not holding services is a poor excuse. We all should be fighting to make sure that our beloved house is there for everyone. Dear Beth Emeth family and friends,

Since the onset of COVID-19, our lives have been turned upside down. This has prevented us from doing the simplest of jobs, and dealing with it has caused personal pain for many. Thank God we have made it through till now. By now, most of you have re-

ceived both doses of the COVID-19 vaccine, and like all of us, are praying for the restoration of some semblance of normalcy. To that end, we have made the decision to return to limited in-person services. There are several important steps that must be implemented before we can do this.

What you need to do:


- Register your vaccination status with the office by providing **a copy of your immunization card** or a printout of your vaccination confirmation from the AZDHS website. This may be mailed in, dropped off, sent via email or brought into the Shul and copied before service.
- There will be a "Liability Waiver" for you to sign before you enter the Synagogue for services.
- **Pre-register** to attend any of our on-site services. You can do this by calling or emailing the main office. Soon, we hope to be able to offer on-line registration with "Sign-Up Genius" website.
- When you come to shul, please **wear a mask**, and bring your own kippah and tallit and water bottle, if applicable. Siddurim and chumashim will be provided.
- Only sit next to someone in your **personal bubble**. Social distance will be maintained in the sanctuary & seating will be limited to 45 people per service.
- Registration & attendance at this time is limited to **members in good standing**. Please contact Paula Forster at <u>paulatreas@gmail.com</u> or the office if you have any questions or to update your status.
- Morning services will be abbreviated to **2 hours or less**. This means we will be shortening or eliminating parts of the rituals that are customary, but not obligatory according to Jewish Law.
- For now, if you are not eligible or able to attend in person, **our services will be broadcast on Zoom** from the sanctuary using the same links on our website. You will be able to view the service, and recite Kaddish at home, but the congregation will not see you or be able to respond to you. Refreshments will not yet be provided.

Opening Event: Tuesday, March 30 - 5 pm. It will be a brief ceremony, commemorating the losses of the past year, celebrating our resilience, and looking forward to a renewed future. **Upcoming Service dates & times:** Here is a schedule of upcoming dates and times. Because space is limited, please sign up early as these dates may fill up

quickly. All other services and classes will remain on-line for now.
