A BOOMING VOICE REMEMBERED

Nelson Magedman was well known for his love of Judaism and his dedication to proper religious observance. What became obvious at his funeral was the deep love he had for his family, and the strong love they had for him.

A lawyer by trade, Nelson spoke endearingly of his involvement in a synagogue youth choir as its Hazzan.

He had been a member of the Civil Air Patrol and encouraged his sons to follow that path while he mentored them in that organization.

Nelson had been an active member or the Jewish War Veterans and held many offices in that organization. He had been proud of his military service and his flag draped casket served as a reminder of his dedication of that service.

What we will probably remember was his ability to chant the weekly Haftarot and his service as Gabbai during Shabbat services for as long as he was physically able. He was able to chant his Bar Mitzvah Haftorah just before his recent illness. It was his booming voice that enabled Nelson to be heard without amplification.

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI J. LIPSCHULTZ Happy Thanksgivakah

It's November and as our minds and sprits usually prepare for turkey and yams, this unusual year we also add latkas (traditional potato pancakes) to the mix when Thanksgiving is followed only a few days later by Chanukah. Thanksgiving is set as the fourth Thursday in November, meaning the latest it can be this year is November 25th. November 28th is also the earliest Chanukah can be. This year as we finish the holiday of Thanksgiving we then go out and prepare in a few days for our first candle lighting of Chanukkah on November 28th.



The simple fact is that we could call it a great miracle that we get to see how Chanukah was seen to the pilgrims as the a time to commemorate Thanksgiving. Be-

lieve it or not, Chanukah actually has a lot in common with Thanksgiving. The early pilgrims based the celebration of giving thanks on the early Jewish festival called Feast of the Tabernacle, or our holiday of Sukkot. Sukkot is declared a time of thanksgiving celebrating the bountiful harvest. The pilgrims based this celebration in the new world on this special Jewish holiday.

The Maccabees of our Chanukah are also linked to Sukkot. In the Second Book of the Maccabees, which quotes from a letter sent circa 125 BCE from the Hasmoneans to the leaders of Egyptian Jewry, Chanukah is actually called The festival of Sukkot celebrated in the month of Kislev (December), rather than Tishrei (September). Since the Jews were still in caves fighting as guerrillas in Tishrei, 164 BCE, they could not properly honor the eight-day holiday of Sukkot, hence it was postponed until after the recapture of Jerusalem and the purification of the Temple. This is the great miracle we celebrate on Chanukah: the ability to purify the Temple and celebrate with great joy that we could worship freely the great festival of thanksgiving on the holiday of Sukkot. They celebrated it for eight days with gladness like Sukkot and recalled how a little while before, during the actual Sukkot holiday they had been wandering in the mountains and caverns and now were free to celebrate their faith with such great joy. When we light those candles on Chanukah they are actually candles of thanksgiving with joy and song. The miracle of the oil was not that the light lasted for eight days but that our faith sustained us during dark times and thus brought us to this great time of joy of thanksgiving.

Today we Jews look at Chanukah and see the true miracle that the Maccabees claimed as not a military victory but the fact that our faith and tradition still carries on. The miracle of the oil takes the symbol of the longevity our Jewish tradition being sustained even in difficult times and that is the miracle we celebrate when we light the menorah this Thanksgiving.


The American holiday of Thanksgiving is a quasi miracle in its own sense because once a year all faiths connect to celebrate the ability to share the bounty of our table with all. Thanksgiving is the moment we can contemplate all the blessings we have in the world. The love and the friendship we have acquired and the special kindness we can offer to others. Chanukkah links all Jews in a celebration of our tradition and this unique year we get the chance to light the menorah as we still enjoy the leftovers our turkey dinner and offer a blessing to all who share in our bounty. Please join us for a special class starting November 4th and 11th and 18th after Thursday minion at 10 for a three part class on the origins of Chanukkah. All are welcome.



"The best laid plans of mice and men...". It's a line we've all heard. Well, it happened again, this time with the publication of the October issue of The Observer.


Many thanks to the people who phoned our office to let us know about forgotten anniversaries and birthdays.


