### Finding Renewal and Rebirth in Trees Rabbi Jeffrey Lipschultz

There is this great song that is sung in January in Israel about the blossoming of the almond tree and the hope for renewal and rebirth which seems strange in January. In the month of January we Jews celebrate an unusual holiday of the new year of trees called Tu B'Shvat or the 15th of the month of Shvat. On Tu B'Shvat it is customary to eat fruits from the "seven species" for which the Land of Israel is praised: "...a land of wheat and barley, vines, figs and pomegranates, a land of olive trees and dates". There is a tradition in Kaballah that includes a special service or seder to be performed to celebrate the new year of trees. In this tradition it is said that the mystical aspects of fruits and their place in creation are revealed.



The story is told that all beings are given their own unique day. On this day of the 16th of this month we give thoughts to the renewal and rebirth of trees and recall creation itself when God gave us all fruits to eat in the Garden of Eden. We will have a special Tu B'Shvat event at our shul that Sunday. I hope all can attend to celebrate this unique Jewish celebration on our birth of trees.

The first story of our introduction to trees is the story of the tree of good and evil. The oral tradition of our people tells us that the proverbial Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil in the Garden of Eden was a fig tree. It loosened its grip on the forbidden fruit, allowed it to be released from its branch by our freewill, we ate the fig, then opened our eyes so wide that we felt naked before the One Who Knows All and is All because our body awareness now became as vivid as our God Awareness, and the contrast became so overwhelming that it drove us to flee from God's presence and hide.

The story of the first fruit we became introduced to is one of conflict because of our inability to distinguish between knowledge of the hidden and the forbidden. In the beginning, we were told we could eat the fruit of all the trees, and now, having eaten of the one tree we were supposed to avoid, we couldn't eat from any of them and thus we were exiled from paradise. So this is what the ancient rabbis meant when they taught, "He who sets his eyes on that which is not his – what he desires is not given to him, and what he possesses is taken away from him". On the holiday of trees we try to correct the error and rebuild our relationship with God through our better understanding of nature.

On Tu B'Shvat, we set aside the forbidden and embrace the possible by seeing the fruit of the tree as the possibility of renewal and rebirth within the darkest time of the year. It is said that the significance of Tu B'Shvat is that until this time of year, trees live from the rains of the preceding year. After Rosh Chodesh Shvat (the new month of Shvat) trees derive their sustenance from the water of the New Year. Because of this, nourishment from the new rainy season takes effect four months after the period of judgment of Rosh Hashanah Thus we celebrate God's forgiveness of us on Yom Kippur and embrace a new year of renewal with the fruits of our trees.


Tu B'Shvat is to commemorate renewal and rebirth because fruit represents not only knowledge but forgiveness. Just as God had forgiven man for his misgivings, we take to heart the fruit that trees give us to help sustain life and we celebrate rebirth and renewal in hopes that mankind can find that inner act of creation and build a better world in harmony with the nature that surrounds us.

As we come to terms with humanities relationship with the environment and sadly our lack of care we see through of neglect we recognize how important human stewardship of our land is so important to our survival. Recognizing the holiday of trees helps us recognize our responsibility to be good stewards of the land and our need to protect her.

On the holiday of Tu B'Shvat, we see hope for humanity as we rebuild our lives from the evil in the world and regain our understanding of what is good and what is evil so to embrace the good that the world produces and we see the evil out there and try and stop it. As we remember the fig tree from mankind's first sin may we use the fruits of the holiday to reveal the true love and humanity that we as individuals are possible of showing and shower it to all who will embrace God's love through acts of creation.

Just think, we just might be the leaders, the "cutting edge people", that help all religions come together to support each other through this crazy time in the world. It is easy to see that we all believe in God and have faith in His living, loving presence. We can absolutely do so many more amazing things when we stand together in God's love and grace than when are standing apart. Now more than ever, the world needs to unite in love and what better way to start than two different belief systems coming together to support each other and opening our hearts to create something beautiful in the love and light of God.



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### **CALLING ALL MEN**


Men's Club on November 21st held our annual Hot Dog day and our volunteers made it a success! Thanks to all who rolled up their sleeves to help.
