

## FROM THE DESK OF TOM BEHRENDT, PRESIDENT

As our Shabbat comes to an end, Israel is defending herself from an unprecedented attack from Iran. Hundreds of drones and missiles have been launched into our Jewish State. We sit glued to our TV's watching images of explosions in the skies above Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, while families in Israel sit in shelters and safe rooms.

Israel is not alone. According to reports, the United States, Britain, France, and even Jordan, have played a role in supporting Israel's defense against Iran. We also have a role to play. We must continue to pray for Israel, as we did this morning in the sanctuary, but more, we must advocate for her now. It is time to raise our voices loudly.

Please use this opportunity to post your support for Israel on social media. A message as simple as "We Stand with Israel" is important. Send messages to our Israeli family and friends and tell them that we're thinking of them. Call the White House and our Congressional Representatives and thank them for their support for Israel against Iran. During Passover, we celebrated the journey from bondage to freedom and from darkness to light. We continue that journey as we count the omer everyday until receiving the Torah on Shavuot. The counting of the omer is seen as a time of inner growth and refinement of our character traits according to the teachings of the Ari z"l (Rabbi Isaac Luria).

Along the path to Shavuot there are a few significant milestones along the way: Yom HaShoah, Yom HaZikaron, Yom Ha'Atzmaut and Lag Ba'Omer. It has been almost eighty years since the last concentration camp was liberated on May 9, 1945. In the shadow of genocide we witnessed the rebirth of our nation in our ancestral homeland, Israel.

Seventy-six years ago, on May 14, 1948, Israel declared her independence. From the ashes of the Holocaust rose the phoenix of Israel. After centuries of prayers, hopes, immigration, planning and work, we are witnesses to a modern day miracle. As it says in Deuteronomy 4:3, "...has any deity ventured to go and take one nation from the midst of another by prodigious acts, by signs and portents, by war, by a mighty hand and an outstretched arm and awesome power, as your G-d did for you in Egypt before your very eyes?"

It has been more than 25 years since I first participated in these *Yomim* (days) in the land of Israel and felt their gravitas and significance. Standing in Yad Vashem and on Har Herzl on Yom HaShoah and Yom HaZikaron to hear the memorial prayers was deeply moving. Picnicking in Gan Sachar Park in Jerusalem with Israeli families on Yom Ha'Atzmaut was life affirming. Attending Lag Ba'Omer in Meron (the burial site of Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai whose yahrzeit we honor on this day) was another powerful experience of the unity of Am Yisrael.

My friend and colleague, Rabbi Marc Soloway, was in Israel on April 13 as over 300 missiles and drones streaked across the sky from Iran. Miraculously, 99% of them were intercepted with few casualties and limited damage. The next day he was able to board a flight to London to pick up his mother and return to the USA to prepare for Passover and receive an honorary doctorate from the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies on May 20. The story of our people continues as we face many challenges, reaffirm our commitments, celebrate life and continue to pray for the dawn of a new era for the benefit of all.

## From the Editor's Desk

May Day, commemorating the historic struggles and gains made by workers and the labor movement, is observed on May 1. In the United States and Canada, a similar observance, which we know as Labor Day, occurs on the first Monday of September.

In 1889 an international federation of socialist groups and trade unions designated May 1 as a day in support of workers, in commemoration of the Haymarket Riot in Chicago, which took place in 1886. Five years later, U.S. President Grover Cleveland, who was uneasy with the socialist origins of Workers' Day, signed legislation to make Labor Day – already held in some states on the first Monday of September - the official U.S. holiday in honor of workers. Canada followed suit not long afterward.

In Europe May 1st was historically associated with pagan festivals, but the original meaning of the day was gradually replaced by the modern association with the labor movement. In the Soviet Union, leaders embraced the new holiday, believing it would encourage workers in Europe and the United States to unite against capitalism. The day became a significant holiday in the Soviet Union and the Eastern-bloc countries, with high-profile parades, including one in Moscow's Red Square presided over by top government and Communist Party functionaries, celebrating the worker, and showcasing Soviet military might. In Germany, Labor Day became an official holiday in 1933 after the rise of the Nazi Party. Ironically, Germany abolished free unions the day after establishing the holiday, virtually destroying the German labor movement.

With the breakup of the Soviet Union and the fall of communist governments in eastern Europe in the late 20th century, large-scale May Day celebrations in that region declined in importance. In dozens of countries around the world, however, May Day has been recognized as a public holiday, and it continues to be celebrated with picnics and parties while serving as the occasion for demonstrations and rallies in support of workers.

Lori Redman has been in education for the past 30 years both in the US and abroad. She joined Chandler Unified School District five years ago as an English as a Second Language teacher. In 2021, Lori made the switch to history, her true passion, and moved to Chandler High School where she teaches World History and US/AZ History. In 2022, Lori worked to get a Holocaust and Genocide Studies course approved for Chandler Unified District. Chandler High School will open their first section of this course in July 2024.

Lori is a member of the Phoenix Holocaust Association and helped establish a partnership between them and Chandler Unified School District to raise awareness of The Holocaust. The past two years, she has worked with the Martin Springer Institute to have their traveling exhibit, Through the Eyes of Youth, in both Chandler High School and The Chandler Center for the Arts. This allowed more than 1500 people, both the general public and Chandler High students, to view the exhibit.

Lori's talk will focus on the Oneg Shabbos group organized by Emanual Ringelblum in the Warsaw Ghetto. This group wanted to preserve the memories, thoughts, photographs, and identity of the Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto. The members felt the world needed to know what was really happening in the ghettos and that the Jews were actively fighting back in many ways. It was about facing the future and taking control of the narrative while also keeping their names and memories alive.

#### **KOSHER FOOD PANTRY IN TROUBLE – YOU CAN HELP**


