Reflections on Torah and Tradition - Hazzan Lev Ettelson

"Time keeps on slipping into the future. I want to fly like an eagle to the sea, fly like an eagle, let my spirit carry me." - Steve Miller

The Jewish conception of time is unique. Following a lunar-solar calendar, the new moon always heralds the coming month, and the holidays are always in their appropriate season. Like the moon, we wax and wane, sometimes expansive and illuminated, other times contracted and dark. Neither linear, nor circular, Jewish history moves in a spiral vortex. The prophetic visions of Isaiah and

Ezekiel point to an idyllic future of universal peace, justice and satiation of all physical needs; sometimes we are closer to that reality, sometimes further. The Torah teaches us that as partners with HaMakom (The Omnipresent) we have the responsibility to bring this vision to fruition through engaging in mitzvot. The purpose of the mitzvot, according to Kabbalah, is to create a dwelling place for HaKadosh Baruch Hu (The Holy Blessed One) here on earth.

Rabbi Alan Lew writes in his book: *This is Real and You are Completely Unprepared*, beginning in the month of Elul "suddenly you are awakened by a strange noise, a noise that feels the full field of consciousness... shaking you awake. The... shofar, the same instrument that will sound one hundred times on Rosh Hashanah, the same sound that filled the world when the Torah was spoken... is being blown to call you to wakefulness. You awake to confusion. Where are you? Who are you?"

A year has passed since the earth shattering and heart-rending attack on October 7, 2023 snuffed out the light of 1,200 souls in Israel in the most brutal and inhumane manner, the most devastating day of violence to afflict our people since the holocaust. From a fourteen hour old newborn to a ninety four year old woman: infants, elders, grandparents, parents, children, friends and lovers, were murdered and tortured in ways too horrible to recount.

I pray that by the time this goes to print, the remaining hostages will be returned to their families for reunion or burial. The reactivation of our collective trauma as Jews is all too real and we need to do what we can to acknowledge and heal it.

Yossi Klein Halevi, author, journalist and senior fellow at the Shalom Hartman Institute, while in conversation with an Orthodox Jewish friend in Jerusalem (who has been building bridges between Jews and Arabs for decades) asked her, "Do you still have hope?", she replied, "No... I have faith." One of my teachers taught me to look at faith (emunah) not as a thing (a noun), but as an adverb: faithing. That is why we speak of acts of faith or taking a leap of faith. To act "as if." Even during times of great doubt or darkness, we can still act "as if" there is a Great Compassionate One. Even when I can't feel God's presence in my life, I can still wake up in the morning, give thanks and count my blessings.

I can still put on tefillin and recite the Shema. I can still give tzedakah and light the Shabbat candle. We can still smile and speak kind words to our friends and neighbors.

In Pirkei Avot, Shimon the Tzaddik (d.273 B.C.E.) says: "the world stands upon three things: the Torah, the service (prayer), and acts of kindness." Shimon Ben Gamliel (d.70 c.e.) also said that the world stands on three things: justice, truth and peace. He was the last nasi (prince or leader of the Sanhedrin) during the Jewish-Roman war which led to the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem and the last (and current) exile.

He was one of the ten martyrs that we recall on Yom Kippur. Seventeen days before he died, Leonard Cohen's song, **You Want it Darker**, was released. It is a meditation on the fact of our mortality and the inevitability of suffering: "If you are the dealer, I'm out of the game / If you are the healer, it means I'm broken and lame / If thine is the glory, then mine must be the shame / You want it darker, We kill the flame."

I've certainly gone to some dark place during this past year, as many of us have, and yet, as the refrain in this song goes, "Hineni, hineni. I'm ready, my Lord." This is a sigh of resignation, a prayer for compassion and an affirmation of willingness to face what is before us in this very moment. Sometimes it is hard to know what to do in the face of the enormous sorrow and suffering in the world. So during these Days of Awe, we will once again affirm, after the grim litany of Unetaneh Tokef (who shall live and who shall die which inspired Leonard Cohen to write: "Who by Fire"): Teshuvah! Tefillah! Tzedakah (remove the evil decree)!

One of my favorite lines of Leonard Cohen was written when he was in his late fifties: "Ring the bells that still can ring. Forget your perfect offering. There is a crack in everything. That's how the light gets in." The stanza before it reads, "The birds, they sang / At the break of day / Start again / I heard them say / Don't dwell on what has passed away / Or what is yet to be."

So after the Days of Judgement (Rosh Hashanah) and Atonement (Yom Kippur) in an act of faith, we move out of our homes into a temporary, imperfect dwelling (the Sukkah). We are invited to renew ourselves, by listening to the music of the birds, trees, sun, moon and stars. After Sukkot, comes Shemini Atzeret, the Eighth Day of Assembly; but the word Atzeret is also related to the word Atzor, which means "stop". The joy of this Shemini Atzeret will be mixed with sorrow as it will be the first yahrzeit of those 1,200 shining souls. During the Yizkor on this day, we will allow ourselves the time and space to express our sorrow and grief as we begin to let go of this trauma so that we may be present to the ever present love and compassion which radiates from the Source of Life. The day after, on Simchat Torah we will dance and sing as we complete the annual cycle of Torah reading, which concludes with the word Yisrael, and begin again with the word Bereshit. The last letter of the Torah is Lamed and the first letter is Bet which spells, Lev, heart. In the words of

Antoine de Saint-Exupéry: "It is only with the heart that one can see rightly; what is essential is invisible to the eye." The Kotzker Rebbe זצ׳׳ל famously taught that there is nothing so whole as a broken heart. "There is a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in."



Tashlich means "casting off" in Hebrew and involves symbolically casting off the sins of the previous year by tossing pieces of bread or another food into a body of flowing water. Just as the water carries away the bits of bread, so too are sins symbolically carried away.





In an effort to share amazing learning opportunities with others, Beth Emeth Congregation of the West Valley will be hosting **Professor Gary Rendsburg** from Rutgers University, New Jersey, over the week of November 10th-18th. His lectures will occur at seven different venues in both the East and West Valleys with a different topic at each location.

Individuals are invited to attend

lectures at multiple locations depending on interest, building positive shared learning experiences and connections within and among communities. Each venue will handle its own registration.

Prof. Rendsburg is the author of seven books and more than 200 scholarly articles. He has produced two series for the Great Courses program, plus he lectures regularly for Smithsonian Associates, the Biblical Archaeology Society, and other adult education venues.

Prof. Rendsburg has visited all the major archaeological sites of Israel, Egypt, and Jordan, plus he has excavated at Tel For and Caesarea. He also has done extensive research on medieval Hebrew manuscripts at leading libraries and has served as visiting research scholar at prestigious universities both domestically and world wide including Israel, England, Australia, and Rome.

His expertise covers history, archaeology, ancient manuscripts, and literature.


